
Positive Behaviour for Learning (PBL)

In each Newsletter, we will be unpacking our approach to Positive Behaviour for Learning.

PBL is a whole-school approach to creating a positive, safe and supportive school climate in which all students can learn and develop. In schools where PBL is implemented well, teachers, executive and family members work together to teach and support behaviour expectations at school. PBL is implemented to improve the learning and wellbeing of all students in all school settings. Every part of a school, including the classrooms, corridors, canteen, school gates and buses, are considered integral to the total learning environment.

Schools implementing PBL clearly define and display their behavioural expectations and positively acknowledge students for those behaviours. All staff are responsible for knowing the behaviour expectations, providing consistent positive feedback to students, and delivering consistent corrective feedback and consequences when expectations are not followed.

At Comleroy Road Public School, we have 3 core values: Safe, Respect & Learn.

Year 5 Leadership Day Recounts





As soon as we got there, the Principal of Bilpin PS gave us a talk about the day. She then split us up into groups, and the Year 10 students took us to different rooms. We played a game where we stuck stickers on the person to our rights back. The aim of this game was to learn other people's names. We had to ask questions such as, Are you a boy or a girl? Do you have long or short hair? Then we wrote a speech about ourselves, and shared it with our group. After that it was lunch

As soon as we got back from lunch, the Year 10 leaders had cards and laid them out. The cards said things like responsible, respectful, caring and honesty. We had to pick three that described us and one that we thought we needed to work on. We then went out and played a game. We had to put ourselves in alphabetical order using our names without talking. Then we organised ourselves according to birth months without talking. Then the bell went for recess.

After recess, we played a game where we had to get into a circle and try to grab each other's hands with one finger, and the other hand had to be flat. On your flat hand you had to point a finger down, so it was just above someone else's hand. When the leaders said go, we had to try to grab their hand with our flat hand. With our other hand we had to try and make sure they couldn't get our finger.

We then went and talked about what the best things about the day were. In our booklet we did a quiz about the qualities of a good leader. After that the Principal from Bilpin PS sat us back in the hall, gave another speech, and that was the end of the year five leadership day. Zara Ciric

The Principal of Bilpin PS gave a short speech, then she put us into groups. Year 10 students took their groups into different rooms. We played a game where we stuck stickers with names onto the person to the rights back. We had to ask questions about who the person was, such as are you a girl or boy? And what school do you come from? The purpose of this game was to get to know the students' names from other schools.

We then wrote a short speech about why we would be a good leader. The year 10 leaders then taught us how to write a good speech. After lunch we played a cooperative game where we had to get in alphabetical order according to our names without talking. Then, we went outside and played a quick game of silent ball. After that, we went out to lunch.

Once we got back inside after lunch, Year 10 talked about the qualities of a great leader and leadership muscles such as courage, support, happy, trust worthy, fun, hardworking, persistent and honesty. We also did a vote on "Are you a good role model?"
Then the day was done!

Bushfire danger period information for parents and carers



Factsheet

This factsheet provides information for parents and carers about arrangements for the bushfire danger period.

The NSW Department of Education has engaged external experts to conduct assessments of all NSW government schools, to identify schools at greater risk of impact from bushfires.

To support the health, safety and wellbeing of students and staff, the department, in consultation with NSW Rural Fire Service (NSW RFS), will direct the school to temporarily cease operations on days when a Catastrophic Fire Danger Rating has been declared for your school's NSW fire area. Alternative learning arrangements will be put in place for these days.

Schools may be directed by the department to become non-operational at any time based on advice from emergency services and the State Emergency Operations Centre.



What is a Fire Danger Rating?

Fire Danger Ratings describe the potential level of danger should a fire start. The ratings are determined by a combination of factors including air temperature, relative humidity, wind speed and drought.

When will I know if my child's school has been made non-operational?

At approximately 4:00pm each day the Fire Danger Rating is issued for the following day. This means that schools, including onsite preschools, will be notified after school hours that it will be non-operational the following day. Your school will notify you as soon as possible by the preferred method of communication.

Parents and carers are requested to:

- provide up-to-date home and after-hours contact details to your school
- stay up-to-date with news and local media through the bushfire danger period.

What education arrangements will be in place if the school is nonoperational?

When non-operational, your school will advise of alternative learning arrangements, including any relocation or learning from home plans.




